


Campaign to Protect Rural England Norfolk Alliance

CPRE Norfolk is always busy. Among other things, we try to ensure development is appropriate to its location.

CPRE Norfolk is not against all development, more housing is required to meet real need. Affordable homes in villages enable local people to stay near their families and employment; retired residents can downsize.

Across Norfolk, Local Authorities have Local Plans in place which allocate sufficient sites for over 20 more years of construction at current rates. Many more sites are being added into new and emerging plans. CPRE Norfolk wants these new sites to be used only once most of the sites in existing plans are completed. The most appropriate sites will then be built out first, providing homes where they're most needed and saving our countryside's greenfield sites from unnecessary development. Developers, understandably, build to maximise returns,

often preferring attractive rural sites. We urge Councils to ensure that existing sites are built out first, to prevent 'cherry-picking' for profit instead of building for need.

142 Parish and Town Councils across Norfolk have signed a pledge to this effect.

Councils unable to demonstrate a 5 year supply of land for housing are under pressure. New sites are coming on stream in emerging Local Plans. Murphy's Rambles (**)

Hello folks

Well, last time I put paw to paper we were wellie deep in snow – I loved it, went back to puppyhood, poor human not so keen! Since then we have had roads flooded, a heat wave, a massive storm with huge hailstones and now it seems like winter again – what is going on?

However, spring was there all the time; the primroses began to emerge firstly in sheltered spots and then in clumps. The violets didn't want to miss out so they were next, being found where not seen before. Cowslips next, just the odd one or two that seemingly popped up overnight then lots, nodding in the wind and seemingly endless rain.

Now we have a wonderful profusion of celandines, speedwells, purple ground ivy, delicate white stitchwort, red and white dead nettle, hosts of dandelions and, in the allotment 'orchard', a blue carpet of forget-me-not.

The skylarks serenade us on sunny mornings as we cross 'their' patch whilst the yellow hammers show off their acrobatics. We questioned the wisdom of a duck trying out a nest site in tree roots adjacent to a busy lane - wisely abandoned. Watching a barn owl hunting a field two mornings running was magical but beaten by one flying up a track towards us and passing within feet of our heads as we played statues.

Human hated it when we happened upon a crow trying to murder a tiny baby rabbit it had cornered – we charged them down like dervishes – soon put bird to flight but alas rabbit too, just hope it was okay. Loved turning a corner one morning and finding a fox walking towards us; didn't stay to say hello though!

Spring seems to have exploded around us with tree blossom everywhere and leaves unfurling to coat all in green, the verges have goose grass, nettles and cow parsley fighting for space. The fields of oilseed rape seemed to grow overnight into a sea of yellow.

Take care all and enjoy the spring

In the Gospel of John, we read of Jesus saying 'I have come that they may have life, life everlasting'. The fullness of life is found in union with Him; how the gifts of the Holy Spirit (First Corinthians Chapter 12), faith, healing, wisdom, knowledge and Fruits of the Holy Spirit, (Galatians 5: 22–23) flow through Him – love, joy, peace, gentleness, goodness, kindness, faithfulness, patience and self-control.

How I wish I could live up to these standards; I fail, as many people realise. But I continue to struggle, to ponder, think and act. To God be the glory, great things he has done.

Burston and Shimpling Parish Council

There is a lot that goes on unseen in Council.

The accounts for last year have been finalised and the audit process is beginning. Dates are being set for the meetings over the next few months. Following the recording of the Council's ownership of the playing field with The Land Registry last year, initial steps are being taken to record ownership of Church Green. There has been a meeting with 'Highways' to discuss repairs and improvements to our roads and with Anglian Water about the progress of the sewerage scheme and their proposals the restore the village to a satisfactory condition when they have finished.

At the Annual Parish Meeting Anglian Water

gave a report, and residents were provided with information about the speedwatch team, the B4RN high speed internet that will soon be coming to Burston (we hope), the Diss and District Neighbourhood Plan, the Emergency Plan for Burston and Shimpling, The Community Action Team, and the Oil Group.

The Don Swanton Award, which goes to a person or organisation who have benefitted the residents of the parish of Burston and Shimpling was presented to The Burston Crown. The Crown is not only a very welcoming pub, but Bev and Steve mastermind a lot of charity works. They have raised funds for a powered chair for a mother who lives in the village, who can now take her child to school; they have set up a musical bursary for a youngster to have lessons at a music school in Diss. They received a large number of nominations for the award.

Over the next few weeks it is hoped that the proposed drainage system for the BMX track will be installed. The track tends to flood when the weather is wet, making it unusable. Anglian Water is providing the necessary materials, and grant aid has been secured from The Adnam's Charity, and South Norfolk Council.

Burston School

This half term we have been learning about dinosaurs. The children have been looking for fossils, bringing in discoveries made at home of interesting finds. They have learnt about many different dinosaurs, such as the baryonyx found by William Walker, the older children creating fact files about this discovery. The children have begun to design their own dinosaurs and will begin sculpting these very soon. In science, we have been carrying out an investigation to discover what plants need in order to grow and to be healthy.



This half term, KS2 children have been learning about World War 2. This has included learning about what started the war, who was on which side, what happened during the Blitz and how the war effected the lives of those left behind. In English we have been reading Rose Blanche and The Lion and The Unicorn, both set in WW2 and then used these to help up write our own narrative based in the war. Maths has had a focus back on the four calculations with some children tackling long multiplication and division. We wish the Year 6 children luck for their SATs next week — they have all been working hard and deserve to do well.

Gissing's brunches are becoming a regular event in the Community Building and have been proving extremely popular, both for the food and the social opportunity they offer. Glorious June (we hope) sees the Community Building celebrating its first year with a Midsummer Party on the 16th. Gissing Children's Centre

Our outdoor area is being improved gradually over the summer to provide more exciting and inspirational play opportunities for the children. Levelling and re-seeding of our grassed area, together with a new defined digging area, a refreshed mud kitchen, and a work bench will be provided while we pursue funding to replace our slightly 'tired' play equipment and we source an all-singing, all-dancing covered sandplay area. In addition, eventually we hope to install a sensory garden/sitting space for those quiet moments.

We now run our extended pre-school opening hours from 8am to 4.30 pm Monday to Friday which includes a daily breakfast club (from 8–9). We also offer up to 30 hours free childcare for eligible families, to be used flexibly, and we are registered as a provider for tax-free childcare. We have spaces left for the Autumn Term 2018 for both funded and non-funded children aged from 2 years to 5 years. We are running a number of Holiday Playscheme days for primary school age children over the summer. The cost will be £16.50 per child and the sessions will run from 9 to 3.30 with the option of a shorter session from 9 to 1pm for £13.50. Children will need to bring a packed lunch and some money for tuck. We will be offering a wide selection of

crafts, cookery, lego, play and exploration, making full use of the adjacent woodland. Recycling



(Stop Press) Our County Councillor Beverley Spratt attended the meeting of 14 May. We heard that Norfolk CC , despite earlier reports to the contrary, was in a sound financial position. Also discussed were the planning issues concerning the 'Harvest House' development on the A 1066 (a planning officer was unable to attend), the work to prevent repeat flooding issues on that road, the need for infrastructure ('potholes' et al) to be improved and concerns at the value-for-money residents feel attaches to the current council tax.

Other issues included improvements to the allotment access, community care, visibility at road junctions, heavy lorry traffic, planning routines and preparations for the 2018 Remembrance Sunday Centenary event.

Community Connection

This is a somewhat abridged version, as the 'Word' function on my computer is not functioning!

At our PC meeting of Monday 9 April, the main points raised included:

Community Support: we are trying to link together the initiatives designed to help members of our community with such things as general wellbeing and security. Our Community Support Police Officer, Jim Squires, will be at our next meeting on 14 May, and everyone is very welcome to attend, please, when we will hear more about opportunities for this.

Planning: we looked at window replacement issues for a listed building in Fersfield.

A 1066 Surface Water: many people have had a bad experience when driving on the A1066 west of the church - and there have been two accidents that I know of. You will have noticed work going on at this location, and we hope the root cause of the problem will be rectified. We will be pushing for a solution that can deal with heavy rain, and we are grateful to Robert West of NCC for his close attention to this problem. (There have, during the recent downpours, been road flooding problems in locations extending from Bressingham's Common Road to Fersfield's Bates Lane: combined with the poor state of roads and the 'pot-hole' situation, a drastic raising of the condition of our essential infrastructure (NCC's domain) is long overdue. We shall be pursuing our Council Tax 'value-for-money' in this respect!

Scheme of Delegation: as so much now seems to be referred to the PC from district and county councils, we are attempting to deal with the additional workload by having a specific involvement area designated for each of our members: this already exists for such things as footpaths and allotments — for which we have existing responsibility.

Water Main Replacement: this work is now nearly finished. We are grateful to Alan Boulter, of Anglia

Water, for his detailed and careful care of this project: we are delighted he has been able to re-connect with us as his health improves after a nasty illness.

'Litter Pick' on 12 May: in an ideal world we should not have to do such things, but we need to show care for our environment, and I am grateful to Geoff Lazell for his commitment to this.


